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

The 10% Solution

The fuel specifications rule in the control-line racing unified rules in the AMA rulebook, adopted about a dozen years ago, has been a good thing for control-line racing.

It has kept speeds down in the top events and kept costs down all the way across the board, and enhanced engine life.

The rule is simple: It just says that racing fuel shall consist of 10 percent nitromethane, 20 percent lubricant and the rest methanol. The custom is that fuel is supplied by contest management, which assures that all racers use the same fuel.

Early on, the national standard brew became fixed at 10% nitro, 70% methanol, 10% castor oil and 10% synthetic oil. That's a good compromise for all engine types, from the real go-fast, high-tech engines to the slower sport engines.

Fuel is an interesting thing, though, in that people have all kinds of ideas about it. Some feel that only one particular mix will work at all, or their engine will be destroyed and they'll lose all their races. Others just dump any old mix into their engines and seem to have no problems at all.

The castor/synthetic question is one of those issues. Some folks feel that a drop of synthetic fuel is death to all engines. Others feel that it makes little difference. That's why the 10/10 mix works well as a compromise.

In large part, success with fuel is in the needle valve. An all-synthetic blend in certain engines, such as some of the Fox models, may require some compromise in needle settings. It may not be possible to run them on the ragged edge; backing off a bit for more lubrication may be recommended. But such fuels — and certainly the 10/10 — can be used in those engines; we used all-synthetic Sheldon's fuel for many of the Drizzle Circuit races in past years and no problems were evident.

The main trick for serious racers is to practice

on the various possible fuel blends and know how to tune for what happens to be provided by contest management.

We may all prefer one kind of fuel or another—we may even be able to make sure that fuel is used in our local contests—but when we travel to a contest, it's out of our hands. The standard 10/10 mix is most likely to be used because it's the national standard, but you never know. Some club may have on hand an all-castor or an all-synthetic brew. We have to know how to use that fuel, because once we're at the contest, we're stuck with it. The contest management provides the fuel, and our own personal brew is not an option.

There've been some exceptions to that in the recent past — a team with strong feelings on the subject has been able to talk contest management into using a fuel that they (the contestants) provided. Because nobody in the pilot's meeting has raised an objection, the substitution has been allowed.

But had someone objected, a real "brew-haha" could have occurred. The protocol for proposed rules deviations is that they are discussed at the pilots' meeting, and if one team objects to the proposed change, the contest goes by the rulebook.

It's easy to conceive that at least one team might object to the substitution of a fuel, feeling that the team proposing the substitution might somehow obtain an advantage by using their own brew.

It would be a good idea for contest management to include a note on the flyers before contests what the fuel blend is likely to be. That way, each team would have the opportunity to practice on the contest fuel. But this can't always happen, partly because contest management is not always able to obtain the desired fuel because of local supply problems — which is one reason that the AMA rule is not more specific on the oil content.

So the best procedure for serious racing teams is to practice on different brews and know how to set their needle valves for optimum — not necessarily maximum — performance. Then on race day, there'll be no surprises, and no arguments.

Modeling database: Here's an annual reminder that there's a comprehensive database of Northwest control-line modelers and hobby shops, and a national database of CL-related businesses.

It's called The List, and is maintained here at Flying Lines' Round & Round headquarters.

The purpose of the database is to make a mailing list available to contest organizers. You can use it to notify modelers of upcoming contests, to solicit prizes from the hobby industry, to get your flyer posted in hobby shops.

Periodically we hear of clubs or individuals getting the idea to develop a big new mailing list. You can do so if you want, but you'll be reinventing the wheel. The List has been in development for 10 years and is updated almost daily. It's available to anyone who wants it to update their local club or contest mailing list.

The information is free if requested on plain paper as a text only, and in this form includes names, addresses, phone numbers and e-mail addresses. If the form of address mailing labels, we ask for a donation of \$10 to cover costs of labels, postage, etc. The List is provided to legitimate clubs and contest organizers; it is not offered to commercial enterprises.

Information on individual addresses, phone numbers and e-mail addresses also can be obtained via mail or e-mail (no phone calls, please).

So, if you want to know how to reach your fellow modelers, contact me and get The List, or the specific information you need.

Hobby shop hop: One area of The List that needs updating is the hobby shop list. We'd appreciate it if everyone out there would send us the names and addresses of their favorite hobby shops, so we can update the database.

The Scoreboard

Northwest control-line competition standings.

The 1997 competition season is under way.

Racing activity began with a bang in the Vancouver area and in Tri-Cities with contests in march, and there was a racing/carrier contest in early April in the Vancouver area. Boy, those of us living in the far reaches would love to be close enough to attend all these contests!

So, here's the first batch of standings, based on results of the March 9 racing contest in Coquitlam, B.C.; the March 15 Columbia Basin Balsa Bashers Spring Opener in Richland, Wash.; and the April 6 racing/carrier contest in Richmond, B.C.

A new event will be added to the standings this year: vintage diesel combat. There are four sanctioned contests for that event on the 1997 calendar so far, three in Mission, B.C. and one in conjuction with the Regionals in Roseburg, Ore.

Results must include the placing in each event through fourth place and the report also must list the number of contestants in the event, in order for the point standings to be counted accurately.



NW .15 Mini-Carrier?

Ray Randall, a Navy Carrier champion in the '60's, published an article titled "Portable Carrier Deck" in American Modeler, March 1962. It was a four-piece mini-deck only 4-ft, wide and 22-ft, long, including stern ramp. The four parts "nested" so the whole deck could be easily stored, handled and transported. Ray credited much of his skill to practice on that deck. The article claimed that, "This device could be the biggest boost C/L Carrier flying ever received!"

Today, with general participation in Carrier at an all-time low, might be a good time to consider Ray's idea in the light of modern developments - especially .15 Carrier, which didn't exist in the '60's. The mini-deck might be ideal for a NW .15 Mini-Carrier event.

It also has several practical advantages over a full-size deck.

- COST Since it uses less material, it will cost less to build. The Skyraiders full-size deck cost over \$500 when it was built three years ago. It is used only twice a year and has not yet generated enough revenue to pay for itself.
- STORAGE The 12 parts of a full-size deck make finding adequate storage a problem. Since those parts
 do not "nest", it takes up a lot of garage space. A mini-deck's 4 parts "nest" into a package about the size of
 a double-bed mattress.
- 3. **HANDLING** The full-size deck requires a large crew for ease of loading, set-up, tear-down, unloading and storage. A mini-deck can be easily handled by two persons.
- 4. TRANSPORTATION A mini-deck can be transported by carrier, light utility trailer or small pickup. The full-size deck requires heavier equipment.
- 5. UTILITY Ease of transportation and handling could result in more frequent use.
- 6. FLEXIBILITY The mini-deck can serve as a landing platform for practice with Class I-II and Profile models. It could also serve as the whole deck for a NW .15 Mini-Carrier event by removing the cable guides and lines from the forward deck, creating a take-off area, and using the aft deck for arrested landings.

Anyone for a NW 15 Mini-Carrier event?
