April on the field

During my lifetime I have been fortunate to be involved or at least flying at quite a few clubs in several states across our country, including one in Hawaii and two clubs across the big pond. Every club has its own style and some have more restrictions or rules than others, but overall they have more in common than not.

Flying at your home field is a great way to become more competent and confident with your flying skills, including being around people you know and flying at a site where you have every obstacle memorized. Your takeoffs are standard and your turns and throttle management are made from cues you have from landmarks. Basically you are comfortable in a known environment.

Speaking from experience it is amazing how, by just flying at an unfamiliar field, you become anxious, overly cautious and flying has become more than just an average day at your home field. It's not as bad now as it used to be, but I still find myself concentrating much harder by trying to be way smoother in my turns and in my landings (yeah right). Now you can psychoanalyze all you like as to why this happens and I am not alone in this, but the bottom line is: It helps you to become a more proficient pilot. Nobody wants to crash, BUT in front of people you just met, that's memorable in a bad way!

As long as you hold an AMA card you can fly at any sanctioned field. Our rule as with most clubs is that you may fly as a guest, twice with a member present. This allows us to visit other club fields and test our abilities. If an event is scheduled on the day of your visit, the Safety Officer (SO) may ask you to fly for him to evaluate your skills. The SO has the same responsibility for his club as ours has for us: The safety of everyone on the property.

One final thought: If you identify yourself and our club, **YOU** are technically an Ambassador for our club! We want to encourage visits from other clubs as well as us visiting them. We can learn as well as lead.
