Spinners club will be co-hosting the March date with WOLF. There is an information flyer elsewhere in this issue, along with a calendar for most of next years dates. Check it out!









Rubber grommet on drill is useful depth indicator. Jeff Hough, Crete, Nebraska.




To fill small-mouthed bottles pour liquids down a rod held in contact with mouth of bottle. Paul M. Trach, Prince Albert, Saskatchewan.




Penlight and suitable shim taped to Dremel grinder will direct light to dark corners. John vonLinsowe, Jr., Linden, Michigan.

2024 - The Year in Review

The flying year kicked off as usual with the NW Fireballs New Years Day fun fly up at Delta Park in Portland. Weather was great for the day. WOLF members attending were Will Naemura, Gary Weems, and Mike Hazel.

WOLF held its AGM (annual general meeting) on January 27th. The featured topic was the flying site situation. Much discussion but unfortunately no resolution to be had. Club bylaws and constitution were updated. Shortly after the meeting Craig Bartlett resigned his position as club president.

Flying activity at the field continued on a hit or miss basis by individuals. Some of the hit or miss can be attributed to the geese population that sometimes "drop by" for a visit.

Activity is always on the upswing by March. The McMinnville RC club put on their annual swap meet, which is always a well attended affair. Mark Crouse was seen scarfing up some good deals there. No doubt other WOLF members were there, but lost in the crowd.

At the end of the month the Roseburg group held a great fun fly at their facility. The day was dedicated to the memory of Dave Shrum who passed away earlier in the year. WOLF attendees included Mark Crouse, Mike Hazel, Gene Pape, John Thompson, Gary Weems, and Jim Corbett. There was a generous prize giveaway courtesy of the Dave Shrum estate.

At the end of May, the Northwest Fireballs put on the Jim Walker Memorial Meet in Portland at the Delta Park facility. This is usually the kickoff event for Northwest control line competition. WOLF member participation figures in heavily for both competing and assisting the contest management there. This included John Thompson, Mike Hazel, Jerry Eichten, Gary Harris, Fred Underwood, Mark Crouse, Gary Weems. Attendance was down a bit this year, perhaps owing to people believing the iffy weather forecast. But conditions were pretty nice thru the event.

Memorial Day weekend saw another edition of the Northwest's control line biggie that we just simply call "The Regionals". Held once again in Roseburg, several WOLF members are involved in the setup, officiation, award donations, and in the competition there. Weather was nearly perfect for the three day event. If you can only get out of town for one event in a year, this is the go-to one.

On June 15th, the final installment of the Oregon Fun Fly series took place. This time it was in the southern part of the state, Eagle Point. The Rogue Eagles RC club have a great flying field which includes a control line circle. They had plenty of flying going on but the sole WOLF member in attendance was John Thompson.


On the following weekend the Seattlearea based Northwest Skyraiders put on their annual "Stunt-a-Thon" contest. Jerry Eichten and Fred Underwood took home trophies for their efforts there.

On June 29th an impromptu fun fly was held at the Salem airport with a pretty good turnout and good flying conditions. members attending were Craig Bartlett, Mark Crouse, Jim Corbett, Don Dotter, Jerry Eichten, Mike Hazel, and Gary Weems. Bruce Tunberg from McMinnville also showed up as did Fireballs Sam Baird and Doug Powers. Jerry surprised everyone when he did an inverted crash landing with his 25-year old Buccaneer stunt ship. It seems he might have been using the wrong control handle for the plane, or something like that he said. It was thought at the time that this might be one of the last flying activities at the field. Of course we know now that was wrong.

During the Nats I teamed with Paul Gibeault for efforts in Speed and Racing events. The World events were fantastic to watch. Since they are usually in far-away countries this would likely be my one in a lifetime chance to attend.

Also attending the World events was WOLF member Will Naemura, who flew the F2A event (FAI Speed). Will has been living in Germany the last few years on a work project, so he entered the event on the German team. He and his teammate did well enough for a bronze medal place on the winners podium. He will be moving back to the USA next year so we will be seeing more of him in the future.

After a long stay in Muncie, it was time to return home and host the Zoot Ranch Fun Fly on August 31st. We had a group of about 20 who enjoyed the pleasant weather, plenty of flying and of course plenty of food!.

The next NW event was the annual R.F. Stevenson Memorial Raider Roundup meet up in Auburn, Washington. What????? No WOLF members attended this year. Let's go get 'em next year!

The first weekend in October has the world-wide Ringmaster fly-a-thon a going on. While we did not have any local flying that I know of, some WOLF members took to the air at both Portland and Junction City flying sites.

The following weekend saw the annual Fall Follies contest, which is now held at Delta Park in Portland with the loss of the Bill Riegel Model Airpark in Salem. The event is co-hosted with the assistance of the NW Fireballs club. WOLF members participating were: Gene Pape, Mike Hazel, John Thompson, Gary Weems, Jerry Eichten, Fred Underwood, Mark Crouse. Also saw Loren Howard, who had dropped off the membership rolls. But he joined back up again. Welcome back, Loren! Hope to see you at some events next year. At this meet the aerobatic competition for the NW is finished. Eichten was just one point away from winning the Don McClave Vintage Stunt Trophy,. This award goes to the flyer with the highest points accumulated from competition in the Old Time Stunt and Classic Stunt events in the Northwest for the year.

And the final NW CL contest of 2024 was the After-Thanksgiving Race in Portland. Gary Harris and Mike Hazel were the only WOLF members competing there. Gary also served as the contest director.

And sometimes we just can't get enough so I contacted Paul Gibeault and we reformed the Can-Am Racing Team once more and headed down to Southern California. This was on the first weekend of December for the local Toys for Tots annual contest. Sure was a change being eighty degree weather this time of year! Will Naemura also was there doing some F2A test work. Seattle area Speed guys John Knoppi and Scott Newkirk also joined in for the fun.

I know that there were at least a couple more impromptu get togethers at the Salem field, and some of you do fly there on your own. 


Trim paper cup, then jam it into rim of dope can before pouring. Can remains clean for recapping, and there are no messy dribbles down the side.





HOT TIPS ABOUT SOLDERING

The process of soldering as a means of joining metals is an integral part of our hobby-sport. The technology has been around for a long time and is basically pretty easy to apply. However, as with any task there are ways that work good and ways that don't. Over time I have worked out some techniques that have proved successful. Read on.

Soldering uses cutectic lead or tin-based alloys to establish a permanent joint The term "cutectic" means that the solder material has a low melting temperature compared to the substrate metals. Soldering works by the establishing of a metallurgical bond between the solder alloy and the substrate metals. A metallurgical bond is the physical joining of layers of metal by interlocking surface layer molecules. There is basically a 3-step process required to achieve a satisfactory joint. I think of this process as CLEAN-HEAT-CLEAN.

CLEAN:

In order for the solder process to be at all effective the substrate metals must be CLEAN! Use some sort of fine sandpaper or steel wool to remove anything on the metal until a bright, shiny surface appears. There cannot be any oils (even skin oils) or oxides (corrosion). The metallurgical bond will not develop over oxides. Additionally, a proper flux must be used. Flux does 2 jobs. First, flux chemically strips the surface clean. However, flux must not be expected to substitute for mechanical cleaning. Second, flux helps prevent the formation of surface oxides while soldering. For general-purpose work I use a liquid flux. Most of these materials are a form of metallic-salt solution. Use just enough to wet the joint. The clean requirement also applies to the solder iron as well. Keep the tip clean and tinned with a thin layer of fresh solder.

HEAT:

The process will only work if heat is properly used. The substrate metals must be hot enough to melt the solder. Do not force the solder on to the iron tip to start the melt. Apply heat to the joint and when hot enough add the solder.

Continue adding while moving the heat source. Liquid solder will follow the heat. Use only enough solder to RH the joint

with a small fillet. Excess solder will not make a stronger joint. Insufficient heat will create a "cold" solder joint These joints have little strength. When cool they are dull and lumpy looking.


CLEAN-

The joint must be cleaned after the solder has cooled.

All traces of flux must be removed in order to prevent long term corrosion. The best thing I have found for home shop use is large amounts of HOT water. Flood the joint while wiping with a paper towel. Don't forget to clean around the joint as well. Hot flux vapors can cover a fair amount of ground. When doing stranded leadouts, clean as far as possible to remove flux that may have wicked along the strands of the cable.

Finally, Use common sense for basic safety. Soldering uses enough heat to produce some nasty burns. Remember, heat will travel so be careful handling the parts. Hot flux vapors can combine with the moist mucous membranes in your mouth and nose. Don't put your face right in your work. Also watch out for engine parts, tools and other fine metal stuff on your work bench. The flux vapors will get to them also.
